- A place that preserves records of historical significance.

How can an archives help you?

- Provide access to primary sources and records of historical significance.
- Talk with an Archivist about your research. Get advice BEFORE getting too far into your research.

Acadia's Esther Clark Wright Archives

Acadia University

The Archives preserves records of the University and its affiliates. This includes, but is not limited to: photographs, faculty papers, brochures, film, architectural plans, artefacts, administrative papers, and events documentation.

Convention of Atlantic Baptist Churches

The Atlantic Baptist Archives, housed at Acadia, preserves the administrative records of the Convention as well as the Baptist Churches in Atlantic Canada. This includes the minutes, membership lists, photographs, bulletins, financials, architectural, and events documentation. Generally, these records are not a good source of genealogical information.

Annapolis Valley

The Esther Clark Wright Archives preserves records of historical significance for individuals and organizations in the Annapolis Valley area. This includes, but is not limited to: diaries, letters, photographs, land grants, maps, and artefacts.
